Sales Policy

1. There is a one week warranty on health of rabbits. We intend the rabbits we sell to be healthy when they leave our barn, but we can't be responsible for your care of them. If they die due to something wrong with them when they left here- I will replace the rabbit with the next available bunny, or offer a refund. **HOWEVER**, if they get eaten, left in a hot car and expire, or their death is due to something that was your fault, I will not refund or replace them.
2. Definition of rabbit quality- Pet quality: These bunnies, although loveable and healthy will have something that I feel will make them not suitable for breeding or the show table. Mostly they are there to love. Brood quality: These bunnies may have some small flaw, that will prevent it from competing or doing well on the show table. This may be a doe that is slightly overweight for her breed, a healed injury, not enough color in a broken pattern, etc. These bunnies will often produce quite well but not be as showable. Show quality: Should have no flaws that will cause a disqualification on the show table. This does not guarantee you will take home first place. Babies sold as show quality may or may not mature at more than the allowable weight, or maintain an injury later in life that could cause it to not be showable. But when it leaves my barn it will be showable in its appropriate class.
3. Holding Rabbits/Down payments- I will hold rabbits for up to 2 weeks for 50% of the rabbits cost. The remainder is due when you pick up the rabbit. I am negotiable on holding rabbits longer but may require full payment up front.
4. Brood quality and Show quality rabbits come with a 3 to 4 generation pedigree. They also are sent home with a small bag of the food they are used to, so that their diet does not have to be changed suddenly. Care guide and written sales policy will also be included. Pet quality rabbits come with a family tree (the names of their ancestors only) food and a care guide.

Rabbit Raiser's Etiquette, Rules and Suggestions

1. Do not change the name listed on the pedigree of your rabbit with out consulting the breeder- What you call the rabbit on a day to day basis is your business, however the name listed on the pedigree is its "official name"
2. Never change the breeders prefix (rabbitry name) when you list the rabbit. Always give proper credit to the person/rabbitry that bred that animal. When you have babies of your own it will be so exciting to add your own breeder's prefix!
3. Weight is listed in pounds.ounces NOT by decimal points of pounds. So on a pedigree when a rabbit is listed as 2.14 that means it weights 2 lbs 14 oz. If your rabbit were to weigh 3 and a half pounds it would be listed as 3.08.
4. Keep at least a 3 generation pedigree for all your rabbits, and expect the breeder to provide one when you purchase a rabbit.
5. If you want to show- I suggest investing in a ARBA standard of perfection book- it's what you will be judged by- you might as well know the rules.
6. Every judge will have a different opinion- don't get upset if you get DQ'ed, or don't place well the first time you show. Every judge is different and you should always maintain a spirit of good sportsmanship.
7. Never take sick rabbits anywhere- face it- you'd be upset if someone brought a rabbit to a show that infected your best rabbit. There is always another show!
8. Don't be afraid to ask questions!! I have asked a lot of them myself! It's how we learn and improve the breeds!
